Guidelines:

- 1. In education, widespread use of the Internet has brought concerns for the unlawful use of copyrighted information in electronic form. This is a good reason for establishing AUP and classroom guidelines. The same copyright rules apply as in non electronic forms. Simply because content is placed online in a web-site does not mean it is free from copyright protection. Teachers and students must always make sure they have permission before posting content unless fair use or another exception applies.
- 2. Make sure you take down copyrighted materials for a particular class when the course concludes. Always check with each publisher for rights and permissions. Some rights are included with subscriptions and may be extended term to term without extra costs.

3. Providing a link to the content in an online database subscribed to by the institution's library is allowed under copyright law provided the user is a current member of the institution.

Guidelines:

- 1. Public Domain is fair use for all to use. It includes publications before 1923 and publications without a copyright notice.
- 2. Public Domain includes published works 70 years after the death of the author.
- 3. Most all works by music composers like Beethoven and Bach or Brahms are now considered Public Domain and can be found at the Public Domain Music Library.

Guidelines:

Music

- 1. Up to 10% of a copyrighted musical composition, but no more than 30 seconds
- 2. Up to 10% of a body of sound recording, but no more than 30 seconds
- 3. Any alterations cannot change the basic melody or the fundamental character of the work

Copying and Distribution Limitations

- 1. No posts of multimedia claiming fair use on web site
- 2. Only 2 copies of original may be made
- 3. For instructional purposes only, 1 copy may be placed on reserve
- 4. Teachers and students must credit sources, giving all bibliographic information

INSTRUCTIONAL MATERIALS - INTERNET

Effective Date: August 26, 1996

The Clayton County Public School System is committed to providing opportunities for students and staff to participate in learning experiences via various electronic technologies. Accordingly, the Internet, a global electronic information infrastructure, is recognized as an important educational resource similar to books, magazines, videos, CD-ROMs, and other informational services.

Information gathered via the Internet shall be related to the educational purposes of enhancing the teaching program and student achievement, providing support for instructional and curricular goals, and assisting students in the attainment of skills necessary to continue their development as life long learners in a technologically advanced world.

The Internet is viewed as a fluid environment in which information available to students is constantly changing. Therefore, the District believes that it is impossible to predict with certainty what information students might locate. The electronic information available to students does not imply endorsement by the District of the content.

The Superintendent authorizes the Director of Instructional Technology to establish guidelines and access criteria as may be deemed necessary in regulating the use of the Internet by students and staff. The system guidelines and criteria will be in accordance with the Board of Regents Acceptable Use Policy for PeachNet. Failure to abide by the established guidelines governing the use of the District is system may result in the suspension and/or revocation of access privileges. Additionally, student violations may result in disciplinary measures up to and including suspension of expulsion. Staff violations may result in sanctions up to and including termination. Violators may also be subject to legal action and/or may have fees or other charges imposed.
