While I don't yet have full clarity on the precise direction I will be going with my research project, I do have a strong sense of direction that will probably be a progressive revelation as I move forward.

Most of us could go a number of directions with this and as a disabled student having read in chapter 1 about orientational research, I thought I might explore adaptive technology and its impact on the visually impaired student. However, on page 56 of chapter 2 in our text, figure 2.4 specifically, there was a helpful chart about the three types of research: Quantitative, Mixed, and Qualitative.

I find myself wanting to take a mixed approach towards researching the technology and impact of a somewhat recent phenomenon that is cropping up in some libraries in higher education - digital media studios. As I mentioned in my introduction, I just took a job in the Digital Media Studio at the James E. Walker Library at Middle Tennessee State University. After meandering through abstracts, I finally narrowed my journal quest to my two favorite articles on emerging technologies in the 21st century library.

Article #1: "Emerging Technologies Service Delivery Models" by Mary Ann Kajewski

The first article was a sound research paper with an Aussie accent. Mary Kajewski is the Online Public Access to Libraries trainer at the State Library of Queensland. While her article was written from within the context of the Australian library system, the concepts were completely recognizable to me as an American because of the universal reach of technology. One quote worth mentioning that captures the spirit of the article states: "New technologies allow [libraries] to provide a better service to users by offering simple access to what they want, when they want it and how they want it" (Kajewski, 2006, p. 157).

In the article, Kajewski stepped library professionals through the basics of leveraging their public or school libraries with current trends in technology. The article was brimming with helpful definitions, explanations, and examples of key technologies that libraries around the globe are diffusing successfully. Her list includes:

- Blogs

- Wikis
- RSS feeds and aggregators (readers)
- Podcasts
- Vodcasts
- Web conferencing
- Instant messaging

She describes case study scenarios for each and explains how these emerging technologies factor into the face of the institution to the patrons they serve.

While the first article I encounter was very informative, the second was fascinating causing me to expand my vocabulary to make room for new sniglets.

Article #2: “Taming Technolust: Ten Steps for Planning in a 2.0 World” by Kathleen Kern & Michael Stephens

The article discussed ten steps that emerging technology librarians, managers, or administrators should consider before diffusing their innovation. The title of the article contains the first new word to add to my internal dictionary, “technolust.” “Simply, technolust is ‘an irrational love for new technology combined with unrealistic expectations for the solutions it brings’” (Stephens, 2011, p. 314). This word was followed by more mind-expanding words such as:

- *Technostress* – New tools, cool tools sometimes rock a librarian’s world
- *Technodivorce* – It’s tough to admit when a mistake is made and shut down an existing innovation
- *Technoshame* – A librarian steps up and whispers, “I don’t anything about this stuff and have no idea where to begin”
- *Technophobia* – Frozen with fear when confronted with new tech

Here are the steps that the authors contend are critical for technical transition to succeed:

1. Let go of control – Providing patrons with useful services transcends control issues
2. Let beta be your friend – Let your users help you work out the bugs
3. Be transparent – Communicate well and often via blogs and open meetings
4. Find various paths or tools to find the best fit – Your services may be better suited to other tools or solutions so do your homework with your community group
5. Spot trends and make them opportunities - Scan the horizon for how and what technologies are transformational
6. Offer opportunities for inclusive learning – Managers and leaders set the tone for adoption of new technologies and the team must learn the landscape together

7. Overthink and die – Do not get hung up on first steps and waiting until conditions are perfect
8. Plan to plan – Create time lines and audit progress
9. Create a mission statement for everything – A vision will help guide development, rollout, and evaluation
10. Evaluate your service – Is this really working and how well?

As if the top ten were not enough, the article has a sidebar listing emerging (and retreating) technologies. What's hot: Open source software (OSS) and Learning 2.0 programs. What's cold: Unpleasant user experiences both in the physical plant and virtually.

Each of these articles were enlightening in their respective ways. -- David

In this series of article critique and analyses, I've been using exploratory research to gain a better understanding of how technology integration has impacted public and academic libraries. I am particularly interested in how emerging technologies have contributed to enhanced patron success. I was delighted to find two very helpful articles towards this end.

Article #1:

Beatty, S. (2010). Information commons, University of Calgary: Providing service through collaboration and integration, *Journal of Library Administration*, 50(2), 145-159.

#### Research Problem

What impact has the launch of a Learning Commons had on the Library at the University of Calgary?

The research topic the author writes about is a detailed description of the main features of the planning process, services and staffing, and highlights of the collaborative partnerships which have developed in the launch of the Learning Commons in the Taylor Family Digital Library. The author includes next steps for the commons establishing new services, programs and partnerships.

This article documented the advent of the Information Commons (IC) at the University of Calgary in Canada in 1999. According to Beatty, "...an Information Commons [is] a new service model for academic libraries where the access to library reference and research service is integrated with access to technology" (Beatty, 2010, p.145). One year of planning and \$2.2 million dollars later, the IC opened on 42,000 square feet of space. "The vision was to provide space, technology and expertise to support the scholarly use of information resources and act as a focal point for information services" (Beatty, 2010, p. 145). The concept of a one-stop shopping service model for reference and technical support was the objective. Librarians and IT staff work together to support 230 computers loaded with general software and six computers in a special media area with higher end software including adaptive technology for the disabled.

The human framework of collaboration behind the technical architecture is equally impressive. An 11-person implementation team comprised of academic leaders, deans, library staff, and students worked on the design document. A sub-committee reviewed and recommended hardware and software. The IC Operations Team was formed to meet regularly after the launch to review and discuss daily operations.

Innovations include 24-hour access, "student navigators" who serve as the front line walkabout technicians (instantly identifiable by uniformed shirts), annual software upgrades, and a 3-year life cycle for hardware. According to Beatty, meeting the changing needs of students is the highest goal and challenge.

The article provides a benchmark model in planning, organization, implementation, and sustained interoperability of reference and IT solutions for library patrons.

#### Article #2:

#### Research Problem

What impact has the Facebook phenomenon had on the Jacksonville State University

library patrons?

Online social networks have garnered much attention in the media but few studies in library science have provided research findings. This article reports on a survey of 126 academic librarians regarding their opinions and experiences with Facebook in the library context with the students of Jacksonville State University (JSU).

The results of the survey of librarians brought mixed reviews with some favorably supporting it while others considered Facebook to be outside academic propriety. Interestingly, the article reported that 85% of college students whose universities are registered on Facebook have created a profile. Not every student is supportive of campus computers being commandeered by Facebook users complaining that often they cannot complete academic assignments prompting campus officials to block Facebook usage in some computer labs.

The authors write: "Librarians in institutions of higher education might need to consider what implications the communication style preferences of these future students could have, if any, on library services" (Charnigo & Barnett-Ellis, 2007. p. 26).

Many of the librarians surveyed have vision for the marketing and promotional value of library services through the medium. The article reported the varied utilitarian uses of Facebook for college students which included:

- search for students by course field, class number, or section
- search for students in a particular major
- search for students in a particular student organization or club
- create "groups" for student organizations, clubs, or other students with common interests
- post announcements about campus or organization events
- search specifically for alumni
- block or limit who may view profiles, providing users with built-in privacy protection if the user so wishes (Charnigo & Barnett-Ellis, 2010, p. 24)

The big idea for me in reading this article is that libraries as well as librarians (or educators in general for that matter) who leverage social networking such as Facebook may win the hearts of the millennials (those born after 1992) which represents 70-80 million people.

Research Problem

How library services around the world are accomodating the specialized needs of blind and low vision patrons.

Reasoning

Being a visually impaired person (VIP) working in a university library (digital media studio) makes this research topic particularly relevant to me. While the James E. Walker Library at Middle Tennessee State University is fully ADA compliant and proactive in servicing the needs of the disabled student population, nevertheless I still face daily personal challenges providing technical support to patrons working on equipment that is not adaptive in nature.

My interest in this research lies in exploring what library systems in other countries like Nigeria, Austrailia, Canada, the United Kingdom, and Korea are doing to accomodate the blind and partially sighted. Obviously, other nations do not adhere to the "Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990" so what provisions are their respective governments making to cope with this demograhic? How many people are we talking about here? What are the delineations between servicing a low vision patron versus a blind patron?

My article search will include refereed articles regarding these issues of select libraries within the United States as well.

Further, I would like to explore what technologies exist and are emerging in international library systems to assist persons with print disabilities.

Difference from previous articles research problems

I have learned a valuable lesson already as a "novice" researcher. I am learning the value of settling on a research topic or problem. It seems I have started wide and am finally now narrowing the field of research by working the process. My first 4 articles were helpful to introduce me to the concepts of emerging technologies but failed to make the connection with servicing patrons with visual impairments.

Article 1 - "Emerging Technologies Changing Public Library Service Delivery Models" by Mary Ann Kajewski helped me understand how inexpensive technologies such as blogs, wikis, podcasts, vodcasts, RSS aggregators, web conferencing, and instant messaging are available for no- or low-cost use but no mention of adaptive

technology for the disabled. Certainly visually impaired persons utilize these technologies but howw depends of the severity of their impairment. The article did offer an international flair in that the study was done in Austrailia.

Article 2 - "Taming Technolust: Ten Steps for Planning in a 2.0 World" by Michael Stephens was a helpful article for learning new vocabulary words and an excellent top ten list for planning library services but again, nothing focused on the visually impaired.

Article 3 - "Information Commons, University of Calgary: Providing Service through Collaboration and Integration" by Susan Beatty offered a Canadian perspective to launching an information commons. Adaptive technology was mentioned but only as an aside.

Article 4 - "Checking Out Facebook.com: The Impact of a Digital Trend on Academic Libraries" by Laurie Charnigo and Paula Barnett-Ellis surveyed 126 librarians around the nation trolling for the effects of Facebook useage but, again, this fascinating look at the social networking phenomena is silent on the emerging research problem that I will conducting a literature review around.

So, the process of learning how to find research articles and become progressively more selective and refining the search is working for me. Having a research topic or problem really made the process a bit easier having a "research target" to aim at.

Here's something that may be a new thought to a class full of educators. I don't ever, ever remember in all my school years disclosing to my teachers (or even classmates) that I had a visual impairment until the first class of my masters degree in 2009. My impairment is such that you would never know it unless I told you or if you held out your hand to shake my hand and I didn't return my hand to shake yours because I can't see your extended hand. If I look at the left taillight on a car I cannot see the right taillight of the car usually.

So, unless a parent tells you, many of you may have students in your class who aren't telling you that they are struggling because it's not cool, or they don't want to appear to be deficient in any way (like me) during those turbulent adolescent years when it's all about image.

So, a word from the peanut gallery...watch for signs of subtle disabilities and if you suspect one sensitively ask the student - privately - if he or she is having a problem that they might want to talk about. Please don't do it in front of the class lest you wound them publicly.

As an adult I can freely be me now knowing I am in a peer group that is mature enough to accept people with any number of diverse issues from disabilities to religious preference. But kids, particularly teenagers, this is where a teacher can either be a stepping stone or a stumbling block.

For this posting, I have located two refereed articles that are helping me begin to answer my research questions.

#### Article #1

Bonnici, L.J. Maatta, S.L, & Wells, M.K. (2009). US national accessibility survey: Librarians serving patrons with disabilities. *New Library World*, 110(11/12), 512-528.

The purpose of this research paper is to determine the current status of user services in libraries to persons with disabilities in the United States. It seeks to offer insight on how emerging technologies are impacting disabled students and presents the case for equal access and universal design to benefit all patrons.

After conducting a literature review, the authors released a web-based survey to 128 library professionals in every state in the continental United States. The survey consisted of 27 questions with one open-ended question to provide additional information. The survey solicited information in six primary areas: user services, LIS education, patron demographics, career opportunities, state & local services, and librarian demographics. The survey population was limited to active members serving the National Library Service for the Blind and Physically Handicapped (NLS/BPH).

The authors report that data analysis reveals that special needs patrons will face challenges on many levels in the next decade. The authors write:

Loss of vision and hearing are two documented effects of aging ... Based on these demographic statistics, there will be an increased need for delivery of services to the people with vision and hearing impairment, placing further demand on assured equal access to information. (Bonnici, Maata, & Wells, 2009, p. 521)

Findings from this survey can assist librarians in planning the delivery of information services to disabled patrons. Librarians can help create awareness to shift services from special access (a segregated area to deliver services to the disabled) to universal design (services embedded throughout all-access areas). The article concludes with the authors asserting that professional librarians will play a central role in assuring equal access for patrons with disabilities.

#### Article #2

Samson, S. (2011). Best practices for serving students with disabilities. *Reference Services Review*, 39(2), 260-277.

This paper written by Sue Samson seeks to establish a set of best practices for serving disabled students using library services. The author writes extensively about the effects and implications of the American with Disabilities Act (ADA) of 1990 and more recently, about compliance to new 2010 Department of Justice regulations. The article underscores the importance of universal design. The author contends that while equal access is a civil right to disabled Americans, best practices can also help improve services for all patrons.

Samson conducted exhaustive research by making on-site visits of eight academic libraries in four states in the Rocky Mountain region. The author interviewed the librarian most directly responsible for library services to disabled patrons. She also observed and

documented physical access to and within each library facility. Further, she collected data on services, management practices, and investments for future services to disabled patrons. Finally, the author examined if each library's service model was either reactive (responded to complaints of disabled students to comply with reasonable accommodations) or proactive (initiating universal design).

The article produced some interesting results. For example, self-reporting students with disabilities were the largest minority group and three universities and second largest at another three campuses. Five libraries based their service to this user group only on complaints while three were ardently pursuing universal design. None of the eight campuses had best practices protocol in place.

Samson (2011) concludes her research by stating: "All decisions about services, collections, and redesign should automatically include the perspective of universal access" (p. 274). The author closes her article by proposing a list of best practices based on her research in the areas of demographics of library users, physical accessibility, services, and management and investment.

My primary and secondary questions are:

"What makes library services for the visually impaired patron innovative, effective, and successful? What are the indicators based on the literature?"

My journey to the above research questions has started broad and increasingly narrowed much like a shotgun blast compares with the trajectory of a rifle shot.

My target population is blind, low vision, or print disability students who utilize the Adaptive Technology Lab (ATL) at the James E. Walker Library at Middle Tennessee State University (MTSU) located in Murfreesboro, Tennessee.

In the article "US National Accessibility Survey: Librarians Serving Patrons With Disabilities," the team of three authors used a survey instrument to collect data from 128 library professionals from the 50 United States and the District of Columbia (Bonnici, Maatta, & Wells, 2009). Doubtless their survey followed the 15 principles of effective questionnaire construction demonstrated in our textbook in Exhibit 7.3 on pages 185-188 (Johnson & Christiansen, 2012). Using a qualitative research approach (more specifically an exploratory process), I intend to construct a similar questionnaire based on these principles for my target population. The questionnaire will be no more than 25 questions in length and will include demographic data, the nature of the visual disability, what reasonable accommodations has the student utilized in the ATL, and what innovative hardware/software has made them more effective. The survey I design will in particular gather the visually impaired student's perception of accommodations that they consider to be innovative, have equipped them to be more effective, and have contributed to their success in their college studies.

To supplement the survey instrument, I will also be conducting face-to-face interviews with the target population to ask open-ended questions to gain perspective on whether they feel marginalized or accepted on campus as a minority group.

Finally, I will be provide an appendix section in my research cataloguing adaptive technology hardware, software, and associated web sites for further research. The appendix will contain photo images of assistive technology in the ATL, the library,

and throughout the campus plus any other ADA compliance indicator that impacts blind or visually impaired students.

My rationale for conducting this research is that I have a vested interest in the subject matter. As a visually impaired graduate student, I personally benefited from the use of the ATL and the adaptive technology they offered on- and off-campus. My association with Amy Burks, Janet Norman, and Watson Harris are ongoing relationships and serve as a tremendous asset for my past and current success as a campus employee working in the Digital Media Studio at the library. In this case, as a researcher who shares the disability of the target population, I might offer a unique perspective that may make my conclusions more believable.

“What makes library services for the visually impaired patron innovative, effective, and successful? What are the indicators based on the literature?”

I will use a qualitative research approach as my research strategy.

My target population is blind, low vision, or print disability students who utilize the Adaptive Technology Lab (ATL) at the James E. Walker Library at Middle Tennessee State University (MTSU) located in Murfreesboro, Tennessee.

My second article in this latest series of submissions (articles #5 & #6) provided another key element that I will include in my research approach. Sue Samson (2011), in her article “Best Practices for Serving Students With Disabilities,” conducted site visits to eight academic libraries to conduct interviews with the librarian most responsible for innovative, effective, and successful user services to disabled patrons.

Similarly, I will conduct a site visit to the ATL at MTSU. I plan to interview the ATL Coordinator, Amy Burks (aburks@mtsu.edu), and after securing her buy-in, will target 50 visually impaired students who utilize the ATL regularly to survey and interview.

The survey and interviews will be conducted in a private meeting space in the ATL over a 2-week period of time between Fall and Winter Break, 2011. For blind or visually impaired students who cannot come into the ATL during the test period, I will offer an option for Skype, WebEx, or telephone interviews at the patron's discretion.

I will also interview Janet Norman (jnorman@mtsu.edu), Assistant Director of Disabled Student Services at MTSU, to collect data regarding the campus-wide initiative to assist visually impaired students. Ms. Norman can also provide statistics of the target population of self-reporting visually impaired students at MTSU. Finally, I will interview Dr. Watson Harris (Watson.Harris@mtsu.edu), the ADA Coordinator for MTSU, and record her commentary on what reasonable accommodations the University is providing for the blind or visually impaired student population and how ADA compliance has impacted the budget.

Based on the reading in chapter 5 of the course textbook on “Research Ethics,” I will design and incorporate a consent form based on Table 5.2 – Information to include in a consent form (p. 107) – and Exhibit 5.3 – Consent form (p. 108).

Artifacts will include:

- \* Photographs of each adaptive technology device for the visually impaired in the ATL
- \* Photographs of adaptive technology for the visually impaired student in the library
- \* Photographs of adaptive technology for the visually impaired in other campus locations
- \* Photographs of ADA compliance indicators (ie., ramps, grab bars in restrooms, automatic doors that open with sensors, etc.)
- \* A list of web site addresses for the adaptive technology hardware for further research
- \* A list of the software utilized in the ATL and on the MTSU campus to accommodate the visually impaired (ie., ZoomText, JAWS, Kurzweil 3000, and other text-to-speech readers, etc.)

I will be collecting data from the surveys to determine the number of service animals that are utilized by the target population and including open-ended questions on my questionnaire to capture data for students falling into this subset of the target population. I will intentionally design my survey and interview instruments to provide specific data and input to sufficiently answer the research question: "What makes library services for you personally as a visually impaired patron innovative, effective, and successful?"

My rationale for conducting this research is that I have a vested interest in the subject matter. As a visually impaired graduate student, I benefit from the use of the ATL and the adaptive technology they offered on- and off-campus. My association with Amy Burks, Janet Norman, and Watson Harris are ongoing relationships and serve as a tremendous asset for my past and current success as a campus employee working in the Digital Media Studio at the library. I feel like a researcher who shares the disability of the target population might offer a unique perspective that might make my conclusions more believable.

Finally, in my original collection of four journal articles, there was one particular article that I would like to pull from as I construct my research plan. In the article, "Emerging Technologies Changing Public Library Service Delivery Models" by Mary Ann Kajewski, she writes about how emerging technologies like blogs, wikis, podcasts, RSS aggregators, etc. are transforming the library system in Australia for librarians and patrons alike. I am curious to find out if these same emerging technologies and Web 2.0 tools are having a similar impact on visually impaired patrons in my target population. Is this user group benefitting from wikis, blogs, instant messaging, web conferencing, and social media like Facebook? Does adaptive technology hardware/software accommodate such Web 2.0 tools?

#### RESEARCH PROBLEM

What are the challenges facing visually impaired students in accessing online research databases using adaptive technology?

#### SUMMARY

The research design of this study involved conducting research with visually impaired students at the Ryerson University Library and the Scott Library at York University, both located in Toronto, Canada. Blind and visually impaired (also referred to as low vision or print disabled) students face significant challenges when using adaptive technology to access online academic databases. The authors contend that "libraries can assist students by providing database instruction tailored to users of screen readers and by assisting database vendors in usability feedback and in marketing options" (p. 149).

#### APPROACH /RESEARCH METHOD

The authors chose a qualitative research approach using a data collection process including observation and the recording of subjects using various screen readers (for

example, JAWS, Zoomtext and Kurzweil 3000).

#### TYPES OF DATA AND DATA SOURCES

Data were reported in two tables: Locating and reading full text articles by database (Table I, p. 154) and student rating of using screen readers to complete specific tasks by database Expanded Academic ASAP (Table II, p. 155). Two examples of the type of data the authors collected are:

1. 55% of test subjects were successful at locating two readable full text articles
2. 35% of test subjects were successful in locating scholarly articles using the Expanded Academic database.

#### DATA COLLECTION STRATEGY / INSTRUMENT

A total of ten undergraduate students at Ryerson University and York University participated in a study conducted in computer labs equipped with various screen readers. Subjects were asked to complete a series of search tasks in three different online databases (Expanded Academic ASAP, CBCA Complete, and Sociological Abstracts).

"For each database participants were instructed to use their screen readers to: (1) search the database for academic articles on 'women with disabilities in Canada'; (2) identify two full-text scholarly articles; and (3) access the articles and read the first page of each article" (p. 152).

#### DATA ANALYSIS APPROACH

Participants in this qualitative research study completed search tasks using three different academic databases using Camtasia screen recording software to capture the results. Both video and audio documentation of the process occurred. Survey data was collected before and after each test session (p. 149).

#### RESEARCH PROBLEM

Are database vendors exceeding the bare minimum for ADA compliance to make their products accessible to the blind and visually impaired user group?

#### SUMMARY

The authors of this research paper contend that web-based research databases are commonplace in today's academic libraries but contend that there is a lack of accessibility for the visually impaired patron. Consequently, libraries rely on vendors to sell them database that are ADA and Section 508 compliant. This paper is unique in that it explores online database accessibility from the vendors' perspective as opposed to a more common consumer perspective.

#### APPROACH /RESEARCH METHOD

The authors selected a qualitative research approach.

**TYPES OF DATA AND DATA SOURCES**

The research design included questions and responses to vendors about their database products (Table I, pp. 513-515) and compliance with Section 508 standards (Table II, pp. 517-521).

**DATA COLLECTION STRATEGY / INSTRUMENT**

The research design included a web-based survey released to vendors of 17 databases offered through the Kraemer Family Library. In May 2007, the authors emailed customer service representatives with a description of the study and request to be referred to the appropriate person to survey in their organization. Using Survey Monkey, the authors designed a study composed of three main parts: General questions about product accessibility, compliance with Section 508 standards, and accessibility testing/usability studies. Featured were more commonly known vendors including EBSCO, H.W. Wilson, JSTOR, LexisNexis, ProQuest, CSA Illumina, and Thompson Gale.

**DATA ANALYSIS APPROACH**

The authors of this qualitative study used a web-based questionnaire to collect data from makers of academic search databases concerning the accessibility of their products. The data was tabulated and categorized in tables using percentage values. The authors then explained the data analysis in their written commentary.

Both of these referred articles are research papers rich in data.

My research question is: "What makes library services for the visually impaired patron innovative, effective, and successful? What are the indicators based on the literature?"

The pursuit of answers to these questions continues to be a process of refinement. I am seeing trends in the literature that are helping bring focus as I design my own research plan. After reading 8 articles now, I realize that I still have overshot the runway and the original scope of my research plan has been too ambitious.

My research design will include a qualitative approach and consist of observation, a survey, and interview with my target population of visually impaired patrons utilizing the Adaptive Technology Lab (ATL) at Middle Tennessee State University (MTSU). I have some great examples to help me construct my survey instrument from the articles I have read in addition to chapter 7 in our textbook on "How to Construct a Questionnaire" (p. 161). I will be guided by the 15 principles presented in the chapter and will attempt to incorporate both closed- and open-ended questions as well as some rankings.

One of the articles I attached in my previous post in the Discussion Four forum zeros in on a key obstacle to effective and successful experiences for visually impaired patrons, and that is their academic research efforts using screen readers. My research plan will include weaving this critical topic into my data instruments to collect feedback. All participation will be voluntary and my plan includes using a consent form.

The possibility exists to formulate a questionnaire for the paid student workers who provide user services for the blind or low vision patrons who frequent the ATL. I will have to create an observation checklist to guide me as I observe the patrons. It is possible that I could engage participants more conveniently by providing an alternative to take the survey in an online format. Also, I could offer the option of scheduling a telephone interview to augment a face-to-face interview. I will be collecting demographic information, data about the patron's visual disability, preferred adaptive technology, what technology is making them more successful, and how they are coping with research database challenges. The two-week data

collection period should be sufficient to collect data from up to 50 visually impaired patrons.

I believe my rationale to reduce my research plan from a campus wide approach to a single lab with the target population is appropriate to answer my research question.

Research question: "What opportunities and challenges do visually impaired patrons face in academic libraries? What are the indicators based on the literature?"

Issues: Life in general is more complicated for persons with visual impairments and working with this population may involve some extenuating issues. Just as teachers must provide "reasonable accommodations" for students with disabilities (longer test times, digital recording of instructions for later playback, assignments in an alternative format, etc.), so as a researcher I must be prepared to provide the same reasonable accommodations if necessary. Life occurs at a slower pace for those who have to take extra time to navigate to class and through web pages. I may have to expand the time allocated (2 weeks for the research period initially) and 15-minute interview periods accordingly. The emphasis in this research plan will be on the comfort level of the participant not the convenience of the researcher.

Limitations: I already know that since I have limited the research to students who (a) are registered with Disabled Student Services on the MTSU campus and (b) those who utilize the Adaptive Technology Center in the library, that I will miss a large sampling of the visually impaired population who do not meet these criteria. My journal articles have reported that there is a significant number of visually impaired students who do not self-report due to the stigmatization factor. Patrons of academic libraries who are visually impaired are either not using adaptive technology at all or quite possibly using it incorrectly because they have never been trained on these devices and/or software to help them. Sadly, this is a missed opportunity for them to overcome their challenges.

Data Collection: Realizing that I cannot devote two entire weeks to "camp out" in the ATC 8-10 hours per day to collect data over a 2-week period, my data collection strategy includes producing the instruments (hardcopy and online versions of the survey) and then training ATC student workers how to implement the survey to ATC patrons. I can train them individually or in a group face-to-face, or I can host a webinar using WebEx at a mutually agreed upon time and record it for those who cannot attend the webinar.

My plan is to pay daily on-site visits to the ATC to distribute surveys, conduct on-the-spot interviews with willing participants, and schedule future interviews. Further, I will conduct observation tests on the database search criteria using speech reader technology until my quota is met.

All the survey, interview, and observation data will be funneled to me from which I will write my research report. Further, I will look for trends in the data to create tables of statistics to include in the report.

I would be seeking to identify greatest opportunities and greatest challenges the visually impaired patron is facing. I will be exploring and investigating what are the best hardware / software solutions that are providing opportunities for patrons to

overcome (or at least co-exist) with their visual disability. I will compare their perspectives with the results of the student volunteer self-reporting surveys to see if any discrepancies exist between the two groups.

Finally, I would take the findings and share them with the Coordinator of the ATC (Amy Burks), the Assistant Director of the Disabled Student Services office at MTSU (Janet Norman), the ADA Campus Coordinator (Dr. Watson Harris), and the James E. Walker Library subcommittee in charge of providing reasonable accommodations for patrons with disabilities. - David

While research plan # 3 had a pair of well designed tables and I thought the "Next Steps and Reflection" section was a nice touch, I still preferred research plan #1. The research question being the first sentence was a bold and wise move whereas research plan #2 buried the question deep into the paper.

The literature review was a model for me to read and re-read to understand how to do it right. Unless my math is wrong, I counted no less than 25 in-text citations in this section. What that tells me is that the author allowed the literature to write the review section with the author providing phrases to connect ideas in a logical fashion. Everything appeared to meet rubric requirements including APA formatting and styling. The timeline table looked especially good and I liked that it wasn't double-spaced like in research plan #2 - it looked cleaner and sharper.

The author goes into thorough detail to express precisely how the plan would be executed (open- or close-ended questions, chi-squares, etc.). Another researcher could likely take the paper "as is" and replicate the study in another academic location with good results.

The five italicized points for teacher professional development helped the reader to capture big ideas from the literature. The citations point to a good reference section if further study is desired. The survey in Appendix B seems to have used the 15 principles for creating good questions that we learned about in chapter 7 of our textbook entitled "How to Construct a Questionnaire" (161).

For these reasons, in my opinion, research plan #1 represented the best sample of the group. - David

Of the three examples provided, research plan #2 appears to be the weakest, in my opinion. The author would have benefitted from partnering with the UWG Writing Center or submitting his or her paper to Smarthinking.com. The abstract seemed to be superfluous and contained multiple paragraphs. The research question required diligence from the reader to locate. While there are no page numbers on the document, I printed it out and on the second printed page, there is a quotation that looks to be more than forty words requiring a block quote format. The paper is littered with APA formatting and styling violations including the reference page.

There was excessive use of the first person in the paper which may have more appropriately been written in the third person. Some sentences did not make sense. For example:

"I would like research to find out what technology is available and what technology would (sic) appropriate for students in my age group."

Statements are made that beg a citation to back them up but none are provided. For example:

"The difficult part of incorporating technology is finding software programs or Web 2.0 applications that are effective." [Here is a good place for elaboration, a citation from a literature review study, etc. to help the reader understand the claim.]

Another example:

"Also, planning for the incorporation of technology can be time consuming." [Strong statement, no explanation, evidence, proposed plan to explore, etc.]

Here's one final example: "Through reading and writing, the use of technology can allow students to interact with other students in another state or even in another country." [Even in context the sentence doesn't seem to make sense.]

In comparison with the other two research plans, this effort, however well-intentioned, falls considerably short.

The author makes a statement in the research plan that helped me to select an article that might have been helpful to include in the literature review. Here is the statement:

"The difficult part of incorporating technology is finding software programs or Web 2.0 applications that are effective."

I want to give credit to Terrie Ponder who originally exposed me to the article I would like to recommend in way back in our Discussion Board Two postings. Her article, in my opinion, is precisely what the author of research plan #2 needed to help his or her research have a better grasp of how to successfully diffuse Web 2.0 technologies in the classroom.

- \* Great sentence: "Lexile can be used to determine both a book's readability and a student's reading ability."
- Group division: I think it helps your research validity to have an experimental group and a control group.
- \* Proposed Timeline – It looks like you put some thoughtful effort into developing this timeline.
- \* Concluding summary: I like that you restate your research question first thing in the conclusion.

#### IMPROVEMENT SUGGESTIONS:

- \* Existing Title: Improving reading comprehension through the use of e-books.  
Suggested Title: Improving Reading Comprehension Through the Use of E-Books
- \* Acronyms: I suggest that you define for the reader what a "PDF" is in this sentence: "...In its simplest form, a PDF..." Not everyone automatically knows what a PDF is.
- \* Clarification: What exactly are you trying to say in this sentence: "In ever-increasing technology states, e-books can take on a very different format than the PDF file."
- \* Suggestion: The word "whereas" in the following sentence could be deleted and would, in fact, help the sentence structure. Whereas usually comes after a comma or semi-colon and rarely begins a sentence. "...Whereas, TumbleBooks and Bookflix..."
- \* Placement of research question: Your research question appears lonely at the end of your introduction and just before your literature review section. Do you think a sentence setting up the research question might help? For example, "This data gathered from this study will help answer the following research question: What is the effect of e-books on learning comprehension among elementary students?" Alternatively, perhaps your presentation of the research question in the "Problem Statement" section is sufficient and the stand-alone line in the introduction can be omitted altogether.
- \* Formatting: I would suggest using a left alignment format instead of a block format to control spacing issues.
- \* Suggest capitalizing the title of the article. In this sentence: "In "Promoting reading: Using eBooks with gifted and advanced readers", Weber (2006)..." I'm not sure you have to use an APA reference section format. I went to the MTSU Writing Center on this for my four-article review and they had me capitalize it. You might look it up at the Owl at Perdue APA web site or in your APA 6th edition book.

- In your introduction, you write: ".Researchers report that..." Do you think that this would be a good place to place an in-text citation at the end of your sentence listing a researcher or two?
- You may want to consider changing from first-person to third-person writing. For example, you write on page 4: "I fully anticipate that I will not only..."
- Your opening sentence in your research problem states: "What motivates parents to participate in school activities is my primary research question and directly aligns to our school improvement plan. " You have posed a question in this sentence without making it a question. Do you suppose it might be better to separate out your research question as the first sentence, as in: "My primary research question is, what motivates parents to participate in school activities? This question directly aligns to our school improvement plan."
- Would this also be true for your second question? Here it is embedded in this sentence: "This was how does the effective use of a school or class blog motivate parents to participate in school activities. "
- Nice timeline. Dr. B. emailed me that he prefers some descriptive statement(s) both before and after the timeline table in that section.

As a reminder, my research question is, "What opportunities and challenges do visually impaired patrons face in academic libraries?"

I had a difficult time wrapping my mind around the theoretical framework concept as it applied to interpreting and analyzing my research data until our last Wimba session. When I asked for some coaching, Dr. B. mentioned the framework of ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act), and instantly it all came into clear focus for me.

Thankfully, in our nation, there have been significant legislative strides taken in recent decades that have transformed the landscape of potential for the visually impaired citizen.

My research data can be logically understood through the lens of compliance to federal statutes set in place to protect the rights of the visually impaired. For example, four of the articles in my six-article critique & synthesis isolated an overarching issue that plagues the visually impaired library patron, that is, academic search databases working incorrectly with the text-to-speech readers adaptive technology. The results were not good in most cases. The bottom line is vendors must put the human resources and capital into their products to meet federal standards of ADA compliance and accessibility.

So, the framework that I believe would be excellent in my research findings would be the federal requirements. Running them through this grid, the findings could report which specific challenges the visually impaired patron faces in academic libraries are a result of vendors' non-compliance to federal laws like the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA).

For my Diffusion of Innovations class, I created a blog where I posted an audio interview that I conducted with Amy Burks, Coordinator of the Adaptive Technology Center at MTSU. This enlightening interview supports the framework approach that I am proposing here. The blog also contains important legislative resource links.

The Civil Rights Movement of the 1960s laid the foundation for the eventual passage of the The Rehabilitation Act of 1973. This legislation made discrimination due to disability unlawful.

In 1998, the Rehabilitation Act was amended by Congress to add Section 508 (29 U.S.C. § 794 (d) § 794d) which required government agencies to make their information technology accessible to people with disabilities.

Finally, I wrote a paper for my "Legal Issues in Higher Education" class during my Master's degree program entitled, "Legal Issues Impacting Disabled Students" that I

want to make available to anyone in this class who is interested.
