Adjectives: review

- Adjectives are descriptive words, they usually come before the noun they describe.
- That is a pretty flower

Adjectives can also follow certain verbs:

The flower smells delicious
 The pizza tastes good
 John seems eager

One syllable Adjectives

• The comparative and superlative of one-syllable adjectives are formed by adding —er and —est to the adjectives.

Compartive –er Superlative –est

Short Shorter Shortest Poor Poorer Poorest

(short and poor are one-syllable adjectives)

Three or more syllables

- The Comparative and Superlative Adjectives with three or more syllables are formed by putting more or most before the adjective.
- Comparative more before adjective
 Superlative most before adjective
- More significant
 More intelligent

Most significant Most intelligent

• (significant and intelligent are three or more syllable adjectives)

Two or more syllables

- Two syllable adjectives are formed following one of the two previous rules.
- Adjectives ending in -y are changed to comparative and superlatives by changing the -y into an -i and adding -er (comparative) or -est (superlative)
- Happy Happier Happiest

Tips

Adjectives ending in -er, -le, ow usually take -er or -est

Narrow
 Gentle
 Marrower
 Gentlest

 Adjectives ending in –ful or –re usually take more or most.

Careful more careful most careful

Irregular adjectives

Some adjectives do not follow the regular pattern

Good Better Best

Little Less Least

Far farther Farthest
