The use of blogs in a classroom can be very dynamic because it brings a whole new meaning to learning. It is a way for teachers to tie directly into NETS standard 2D – by providing students with a varied format for assessment aligned with content and technology standards. Teachers can post sections of a lesson on a blog and have students complete according to each section. It also allows students to collaborate to share ideas about assignments. As a result, students learn from each other, are assessed based on their work and are motivated to learn using a varied format

When teachers utilize blogging for class assignments, they are modeling digital etiquette and responsible social interactions – NETS standard 4C. Students need to have a model because many tend to not understand the meaning of etiquette online or in the classroom and blogging for learning will increase responsible social actions. Additionally, teachers have the opportunity to participate in global learning to explore other creative applications by building professional learning communities where colleagues and other educators participate to discuss new technology available that can promote student learning. I would like to use blogging in my literacy classes to conduct online literature circles. This would serve as a way to extend student thoughts about readings as well as motivate those students who do not like to read. Unfortunately, my school district blocks all social networking websites at this time.
